History of the stylistic and cultural development of music: Ancient through Classical.

Course Objectives

This course discusses Western music history from antiquity through the classical period. It will focus on the musical characteristics, instruments, and notable composers of each era within the historical, cultural, and political framework of the time in order to provide a framework for understanding the development of music.

Learning Outcomes

- Music history literacy: Students will be able to visually and aurally identify the central repertoire of Western European music from ancient to classical, including styles, theory, instrumentation, function, performance practice, and notable composers. Music history study is a foundation for success as a professional musician, music educator, and music academic.
- Critical thinking and communication: Students will engage critically with readings about music development and the cultural and political context that influenced the era. Class discussions, weekly reflections, group presentations, and exam questions will provide opportunities to foster development of critical analysis and communication skills. Understanding the broader contexts of music history will

facilitate the development of an identity as a musician and the role of music in the human experience.
