# **Course Information**

Course Delivery: Online

**Prerequisites:** This course does not have any prerequisites. Meets International Perspectives Requirement.

**Course Description:** The goal of this course is to provide learners with tools to expand their listening experiences for a richer and deeper enjoyment of music. By completing required readings, listening activities, watching videos, responding to quick checks, and doing ungraded and graded assignments, learners will learn to use active listening skills to identify basic musical elements in the music of diverse cultures and time periods.

# Course Learning Objectives (CLOs)

Upon completing this course, students will be able to do the following:

- CLO #1: Apply active listening skills for a richer and deeper enjoyment of music.
- CLO #2: Use perceptive listener skills to a variety of different musical sounds.
- CLO #3: Analyze the human responses expressed in different types of music and the influence of cultural and social foundations.

- CLO #4: Analyze the basic rhythm elements in music and how culture and time period influences them.
- CLO #5: Describe different melody types and elements of a melody.
- CLO #6: Describe dynamics, timbres, and textures in music.
- CLO #7: Identify different types of musical forms.

# **Course Format**

- This class is run mainly asynchronously, with five mandatory synchronous online meetings via Webex: one orientation meeting and four concert reflection meetings.
- Each unit contains instructional materials to review and study, several ungraded activities to test student's knowledge such as quick checks and self-tests, one assignment divided into multiple parts, and one exam on Canvas. Four units have a written concert reflection.
- Course materials are available according to schedule. Each unit is released for a period of time during the semester. You can study the lessons at your own pace, but be sure to complete all the requirements of each unit by the due dates in Central Time.
- In this course, you will meet with peers in small groups in the virtual meetings. You are expected to
  participate in group discussions and other learning activities. Make sure you engage in the online
  activities, respect your classmates, contribute to the discussions, and ask questions. You are
  expected to follow ISU's Principles of Community
- All communication within the course should adhere to university standards of <u>Effective</u>
   <u>Communication Practices</u>. Specifically,
   communication should be scholarly, respectful, professional, and polite. Use correct spelling and grammar.

# **Learning Materials & Activities**

- Required course materials are available on Canvas in the Modules tab under each lesson. Learning
  materials are presented in multiple formats: lesson content, articles, external sites, audio clips,
  videos, and images. Read and review everything posted for each lesson before completing the
  assignment and exam of each module. No textbook is required. NOTE: Audio recordings and videos
  are only available for teaching, studying, and completing assignments.
- The first unit is the building blocks of using active listening skills. You will first learn and engage with
  the materials. Then, you will complete an assignment divided into three parts and an auto-graded
  exam. Lastly, you will apply your knowledge in a written concert reflection and attend a concert
  reflection meeting. The reflection is graded using the rubric provided on the concert reflection
  instruction page.

• Units II through V are related to basic musical elements in the music of diverse cultures and time periods, including rhythm, melody, dynamic, timbre, texture, musical forms and styles. You will first learn and engage with the materials for each unit. Then, you will complete an assignment and an auto-graded exam for each unit. Each unit assignment is divided into multiple parts throughout the unit. Then, you will apply your knowledge in a written concert reflection and attend a concert reflection meeting for units II through IV. These reflections are graded using the rubric provided on the concert reflection instruction page.

# Assessment & Grading

To successfully complete this course, students will do the following:

- Read and engage with all materials in each lesson.
- · Read assigned articles.
- Listen to audio clips and watch videos.
- Complete the quick checks and a self-test in the lessons.
- Complete five exams, five assignments, and four written concert reflections.
- Attend and participate in four virtual concert reflection meetings.

#### **Assessments**

**Assignments:** You are required to complete five assignments. Each assignment is divided into multiple parts and is worth 40 points in total. You are expected to complete the assignments on Canvas according to the schedule below (Table 1). Instructions for each assignment can be found in the corresponding lesson in the course. Submitting the assignment after the due date results in five-point deductions per 24 hours after the due time, so be sure to start early and do not wait until the due date.

**Exams:** There will be five online exams covering the course materials. Each exam is worth 40 points and consists of multiple-choice and true-false questions. You are expected to complete the exams according to the following schedule (Table 2).

- Exams are posted on the course modules under "Exam" in each unit.
- · Open notes are allowed.
- Exams should be completed individually on your own and not in consultation with others.
- Each exam has 40 questions.
- The format is multiple-choice and true-false.
- The exam questions cover all materials from the corresponding lessons in each module.
- You have 60 minutes on each exam. Only one attempt is allowed.
- Exams will not be available after the due date and time, so be sure to start early and do not wait until the due date.
- Exams are graded automatically by Canvas. To check your scores, click "OK" after you have successfully submitted your exams.

**Concert Reflections:** You are required to submit four written reflections and attend four virtual concert reflection meetings according to the following schedule (Table 3). These are intended to have learners engage with and apply the knowledge they learned in the module. Each reflection is worth 25 points - 10 points for the written reflection and 15 points for attending and participating in the reflection meeting.

- Each meeting will be 50 minutes in length.
- Multiple sessions are available during each concert period. You must choose the day and time that best fits your schedule. The virtual concert meeting dates will not be rescheduled.
- Instructions for how to sign up and prepare for the meetings can be found on "Concert Reflection (Instructions)" under each unit.
- Attend and actively participate in the reflection meetings are required to receive concert reflection credits. Please check the rubric to view the grading criteria.
- Submitting the written reflection after the due date results in five points deduction per 24 hours after the due time, so be sure to start early and do not wait until the due date.
