<u>Course Description</u>: This course is designed to give the future teacher the basic knowledge and skills they will need to teach low brass instruments effectively to students of all levels. This will involve general knowledge, teaching theory and practicum, and basic performance mastery.

Student Learning Outcomes and Objectives: By the end of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1) Teach and demonstrate for a student how to assemble his or her instrument, using a step-by-step set of instructions, including how to:
 - a) open the case
 - b) assemble the instrument
- 2) Teach and demonstrate for a student how to properly hold his or her instrument, including:
 - a) hand/finger/arm position
 - b) instrument angle
 - c) posture (sitting and/or standing)
- 3) Teach and demonstrate for a student how to produce a good quality tone on his or her instrument, including:
 - a) breath control air management
 - b) embouchure formation, placement on the instrument, and how to properly manipulate the embouchure
- 4) Teach and demonstrate (if possible) for a student the correct slide positions and fingerings for two chromatic octaves and how it relates to the harmonic series of the instrument.
- 5) Teach and demonstrate for a student how to properly care for and maintain his or her instrument, including step-by-step procedures for the following:
 - a) routine cleaning of the instrument
 - b) how to apply lubricants

- 6) Recommend appropriate equipment for all levels of students (beginner/intermediate/professional), including:
 - a) mouthpieces (have knowledge of the major brand numbering systems)
 - b) instruments
- 7) Recommend professional recording musicians for reference for students.
- 8) Name and identify the parts of the instrument.
- 9) Name at least five (5) solo pieces from each grade level (levels 1-6) for each instrument (30 solos total).
- 10) Name several graded studies and methods for each instrument.
- 11) Understand and be able to explain the harmonic series and its relationship to slide positions and valve fingerings.
- 12) Understand when and how to utilize brass mutes, including:
 - a) terminology (in most commonly found languages)
 - b) types of mutes
 - c) recommended brands
 - d) pitch problems related to using mutes
- 13) Understand the pitch tendencies for each instrument and how to adjust the instrument

Assignments/Grading:

Students are expected to come prepared to every class. Every student is expected to practice the instrument being studied (trombone, euphonium, or tuba) 20-30 minutes a day for a minimum of 3 hours per week. Reading assignments will cover chapters in Whitener's "A Complete Guide to Brass" and various handouts/online articles. Course documents/handouts on Canvas (or sent electronically) should be printed out and brought to class on the date listed. Reading assignments must be completed before class so you are fully prepared for the class discussion.

Final grades will be determined by the following breakdown:

1. Four playing exams 40% (10% each) (or teaching assignments for low brass majors)

Trombone written exam
 Euph/tuba written exam
 Teaching exam/demo
 Unannounced quiz(s) over assigned readings

6. Notebook 10%

Attendance:

While attendance does not appear in the grading policy breakdown, it is expected that you will attend every class. Advanced notice for any absence is required. Whether or not the absence is excused or unexcused will be determined by the course instructor. After the first unexcused absence, each unexcused absence will lower your final grade one half letter, ex. A to A-, etc.

Late/Make-up Assignments/Quizzes/Exams:

Make-ups will only be available due to a legitimate excused absence approved in advance by the instructor. If the student fails to meet these requirements, make-up exams/quizzes, and late assignments will not be allowed, and the resulting grade will be zero. All assignments are expected to be turned in on time.

Teaching Exam/Demonstration:

You will be required to <u>teach a person who has never played a low brass instrument</u>. The teaching exam may be completed on your choice of instrument (trombone, euphonium, or tuba) and will be videorecorded and uploaded to Canvas. You will have 10 minutes to display your knowledge and understanding of teaching techniques as it applies to the student. There will be additional instructions as the teaching exam approaches. Please see Canvas for an example teaching video.

You will turn in a notebook (3 Ring binder) that will serve as a resource in your career. ALL NOTES MUST BE TYPED, ORGANIZED, and INCLUDE THOROUGH INFORMATION FROM LECTURES. ALL HANDOUTS OR DOCUMENTS ON CANVAS OR SENT ELECTRONICALLY SHOULD BE INCLUDED. The notebook must be divided into sections using tabbed dividers. TABS AND TITLE PAGE MUST ALSO BE TYPED. The sections will be labeled:

Title Page (preceding first tab or on front cover of binder) – Name of Class, Name, Year

- Section 1- Parts of the Trombone, Euphonium, Tuba
- Section 2- Slide Positions and Fingering Charts
- Section 3- Scales and Exercises
- Section 4- Care and Maintenance
- Section 5- Common Problems: Diagnosis/Prescription
- Section 6- Recommended Equipment (instrument brands, mouthpieces, mutes)
- Section 7- Recording Artists
- Section 8- Recommended Literature (solos by grade and method books)

*The notebook will be handed back for you to use on the Final Exam. It will be to your benefit to turn in a superbly organized notebook. Obviously, photocopies of the textbook will not be allowed.

Instrument Check-out/Liability

It is your responsibility to keep each instrument safe that is checked out to you throughout this course. You are responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. If loss or damage occurs, your student account will be charged. It is recommended to store your instrument in a locker, which may be obtained by contacting the Music Hall front office.
