Course Description: This course will be a laboratory for theatrical creation where students will experience the process of collaborating to produce a fully realized One Act play as well as devised/generative theatre. We will focus on ensemble, storytelling, creativity, collaboration, and world building. We will explore devising techniques and professional practices. And then, prompted by various circumstances students will collaborate to create dynamic theatrical events that tell stories, evoke emotions, engage the senses, and inhabit unique worlds.

The information in this syllabus is subject to change in extenuating circumstances. Changes to the course syllabus will be provided in writing and announced via course-wide announcements.

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Course Format

This course is a face to face course.

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Course Goals and Learning Objectives (CO)

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Students will engage in Devised Theatre exercises and Direct a fully mounted One Act Play in order:

- -to further sharpen skills developed in Directing I, including beat work, working with actors, director's concept, tempo, rhythm, and mood analysis
- -to further explore and hone skills in movement, picturization, and blocking
- -to practice skills in rehearsal techniques
- -to focus on creating an entirely unique world in which each play/scene can take place

- -to practice the collaborative process of working together as actors, directors, designers, and theatremakers
- -to have the practical experiences of fully mounting a one-act play
- -to strengthen skills in critical thinking, leadership, collaboration, and empathy
- -to continue to develop a personal artistic voice by pinpointing stylistic and aesthetic preferences
- -to gain exposure to new plays, people, personal history, and experiences, in order to become a more well-rounded and informed theatre artist
- -to work as an artistic community in developing the skills of directing

Learning Objectives:

After the completion of Theatre 456, students will be able to:

- -Articulate their own unique directing/theatre style and theory
- -Identify the relevancy of their artistic work in regard to current social, political, and/or local events
- -Plan, organize, and lead a production from auditions through rehearsals to a fully mounted public performance
- -Collaborate with fellow artists to put together a theatrical product
- -Evaluate and analyze their own growth and learning, as well as the growth and learning of their classmates

Devised Theatre Projects: Students will collaborate on a variety of devised theatre projects throughout the semester

One Act Play: Each student will direct a one-act play of their choosing, to be performed in Fisher during finals week. A fully detailed prompt book and analysis will accompany this project. Students will be graded on process via online blog entries, progress via a check in a week or two before the performance as well as the final product. Students will also be required to attend the rehearsal and give feedback to at least two other students' One Act. In addition, students will participate in weekly production meetings with student designers as well as bi-weekly check ins with the instructor about their plays.

Contemporary Director/Devising Ensembles Research Presentation: Choose a contemporary Director or Devising Ensemble to research and give a presentation.

Personal Theory/Artistic Mission Statement: At the end of the semester, you will write and present to the class your personal artistic mission statement.

Play Attendance: You must attend the performances of the ISU mainstage season. Class discussions will be held on all mainstage plays.

Collaboration: It has been said that theatre is the most collaborative of art forms. In order to exercise this concept, this class will be set up as an artistic community, dependent on the participation and enthusiasm of each member for the success of the whole. In-class exercises, discussion and projects make up a major portion of this course. Subsequently, if a student fails to contribute by not speaking up or not attending, the student's participation grade will be penalized. Active, engaged, and passionate participation is the central requirement of this course. The class will determine the community agreements that govern our work together.

Attendance: Attendance and promptness are a requirement for all theatre classes. The collaborative nature of theatre requires commitment of all individuals to the group. Punctuality is also key to the health of your career in the professional theatre. Attendance will not be taken in this class. But failure to attend class will drastically impact your success in the course and most importantly the success of your fellow collaborators.

Writing: Since this is a college level course, students are expected to write at a college level. Students are expected to hand in assignments that are neatly typed, double spaced with proper margins, correctly spelled, grammatically correct, and stapled. Major points will be deducted for incorrect spelling and grammatical errors (including comma splices, run on sentences, sentence fragments, etc.).

Public Speaking: The ability of students to be efficient verbal communicators is of paramount importance to their success. Therefore, the presentations included in this class will partly focus on cultivating the skill of verbal communication. Students will be expected to speak and present in an enthusiastic, professional, passionate, and educated manner.
