#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

This course is designed as a <u>workshop process</u> of a professional musical stage presentation with the addition of written assignments and hands-on theatre training. Students, acting as creative rather than interpretive artists, will study and breakdown music and text, work to originate and develop and originate characters, and explore the acting aspects of musical theatre including vocals, choreography and dialogue through workshopping, rehearsing, and presenting the new musical BABA in a public performance.

#### ITEMS TO BE GRADED

<u>ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION</u>: Attendance at all scheduled rehearsals and performances is mandatory. Participation refers to your active contribution and due diligence in the completion of tasks as directed by the production team, faculty design mentors, or shop supervisors.

Students may be excused for absences for any of the following—with proper documentation:

**PRIMARY AND FINAL REFLECTION PAPERS:** Upon receipt of a full libretto, all students will submit a character, design, or production analysis and a reflection on the early work in the process (due by March 11). Students will later evaluate their progress and growth through a process analysis after the workshop performance (due by May 6). Further instructions will be provided in class.
